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




Look at -re, -dis,-un in the words unhappy, re start, disconnected and unlike

They are called prefixes.

Prefixes are added to the **beginning** of the words.


When prefix is added the meaning of the word is changed.



Prefix root

E.g. Unkind Unusual Uncommon disloyal disappear dishonest rewrite replay reuse

The tree has the root words at the root and prefixes on tree top. Match them to make meaningful words.



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When we add prefixes: The meaning is changed but the word class is the same.

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
