Padma I thought I would show the brochures to my parents too, and go through them

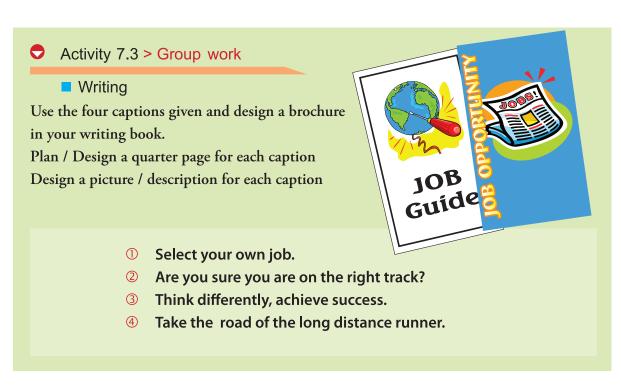

Running is a great activity. It keeps you fit. What is still better is that it releases the tensions of work. It is not possible to worry when you are running. You also see your problems from 'afar'! That makes it easier to find solutions. Most heart patients are told to walk. There are some suffering from diabetes, who take running as a treatment. Most activities that are 'monotonous' like sewing, sweeping are stress free.

An Introduction to the Teacher

The grade 10 Pupil's Book and the Workbook include materials and activities concerned with the learner's need to acquire the four primary skills; listening, speaking, reading and writing. It is an uncontested axiom that all four skills must be developed to give language competence and fluency to the student. Listening is of prime importance in second language teaching. Specific listening activities cannot be given in the Textbook. The most effective listening activities are those where the students do not have a copy of the passage; otherwise it becomes a reading lesson.

There are some listening activities devised in the Pupil's Book where one student reads or speaks and the others listen and respond.

Most of the activities are set for pair work and group work. The aim is to focus on the spoken use of language; to get learners talking to each other. Then it leads to reading and writing. Group work allows the learner to develop fluency in the use of language features that they have already learnt. It also provides opportunities for the learners to learn communication strategies apart from many other advantages. Group work is one of the most valuable sources if properly handled.

The most important requirement in all these is that the teacher has to be prepared. She / He must read the lesson prior to going to class, be sure of the pronunciation, and the meanings of vocabulary items.

This book provides poems, songs, stories and other literary forms as enrichment activities.

Poetry and songs carry the rhythms of the language and therefore is a very potent instrument in the hands of the teacher. Poetry is also the vehicle of emotion. This is also an educative experience for the child; teaching of the emotions is the

foundation of a moral education. That is how the literature carries the culture of the land. Concepts like marriage, love, death, which are the normal and natural activities of a society, are brought to the child through poetry. Even nursery rhymes, 'The farmer takes a wife', 'Will you marry me?' Kissed the girls' come in nursery rhymes. 'Solomon Grundy' takes a child from birth through marriage to death. These must be taught as a matter of course, naturally. Children will see the relationships and understand them in their own way, in their own country and culture.

In teaching poetry, remember the most important things are colour and sound. Get the students to go through these experiences, talk about them and express their own opinions and feelings about these poems, songs and stories.

Get students to do the activities set on them in pairs and groups. Then get them to read the lines aloud, in pairs, groups and individually. Get them to simulate situations. Next engage them in their own creations.

Do not stand by the order of the lessons. Take the poems and songs whenever the students are in a mood, and repeat as often as you can.

Not all students will be able to recite or sing. But all students will appreciate the contents. You must learn to identify those who are able to recite and sing. Get them to lead the singing and the reciting.

And as in all good teaching experiences, the teacher is the best learner, observer, and guide. With every new experience the teacher learns a lesson. Happy learning, happy teaching!
