(c) Explain the speaker’s situation. (5 marks)
- (ii) “Then oars divide the ocean

Leap, splash less as they swim.”
- (a) Where are these lines taken from? Who wrote it?
(b) What are the actions described by these lines?
(c) Name a literary device used in this poem and what is the effect of it? (5 marks)
- (iii) “Dost thou withdraw; then the wolf rages wide,
And then the lion glares through the dun forest:”
- (a) What is the work in which these lines appear. Who wrote it?
(b) Name the speaker. Whom is the speaker addressing?
(c) Describe the situation illustrated by these lines. (5 marks)
- (iv) “I told you not to, and now I tell you that you may”.
- (a) Where are these lines taken from? Who wrote it?
(b) Who is the speaker? To whom is the speaker talking?
(c) Explain this situation. (5 marks)

- (v) "I'm afraid it will not go with my dress".
- (a) Where are these lines taken from? Who wrote it?
- (b) Who says these words to whom?
- (c) What qualities of the speaker are revealed by these words? (5 marks)

- (vi) "It is OK if I die because it is my job and I am ready for it."
- (a) Name the work that carries these lines. Who is the speaker?
- (b) Whose words are these? Whom are these words spoken to?
- (c) What is your attitude towards the person who says these lines? (5 marks)
